Cole library starts a new life as a Community Room

When McCurdy Ministries Community Center staff was asking local nonprofits about community needs one issue came up again and again. Space for community meetings in Española is desperately needed. As MMCC began updating of the Cole Adult Ministries Center plans were made to turn the old library into a Community Room complete with conference tables, serving area, sink and audio visual equipment so the room could be used for social events, conferences, board meetings, classes, programs and worship.

Thanks to our many volunteers and maintenance staff updates to the room included removing a door, stucco repair, painting, repair of the carpet, installation of new energy efficient shades, building a window wall to create a History Gallery, installing a smart TV, audio equipment, a sink and serving area. The crowning touch was mounting decades of McCurdy alumni class photos around the room to create a wonderful homage to our history. The first event held in the room was the McCurdy Board Retreat in October followed by the Board Kickoff of the Creating Hope, Empowering Lives Capital Campaign. Other events held in the room include a Christmas Open House for staff and community, the McCurdy Pre-K Holiday Program, staff meetings, a memorial service for long time McCurdy volunteer and supporter, David Milhouse, and a

Martin Luther King Jr. Celebration for the entire community. "We are so pleased with how the Community Room turned out and are excited to see how it is already being used by our staff and community as a muchneeded gathering space," says Amanda Mountain, associate director of development at McCurdy.

As plans begin to unfold for an MMCC Nonprofit Hub we anticipate numerous events will be held in this room for the good of the community including Adult Education and Continuing Education of

Thanks to your generosity 2018 Giving Tuesday breaks records

On Nov. 28, 2017, the McCurdy Ministries Community Center (MMCC) donors broke our **Giving Tuesday 2017** record by raising \$71,050 from 128 donors across the United States. "We are deeply grateful to the anonymous donors who provided \$31,000 of match for **Giving Tuesday 2017**. Knowing that if you give a dollar it will be matched really motivates our supporters," says Rev. Diana Loomis, director of development/church relations. In 2016 we raised \$62,355 so McCurdy received an increase of \$8,695 in 2017. The first year MMCC participated in Giving Tuesday was 2013 and we raised \$31,524. This year we more than doubled that amount thanks to our very generous donors.

Next year Giving Tuesday will be on Nov. 27 and MMCC will be looking for donors to contribute match to help the 2018 campaign be even more successful than previous years. At this point our 2018 goal is to raise \$75,000.

Project Cariño is growing in the ways we serve

Project Cariño has been blessed with so many opportunities to serve! We have recently added Sally VanCuren, from Western New Mexico University, as a master level social work student intern to our staff. She provides counseling services for a small caseload of students and their families. Also, we have received support from various Volunteers in Mission Teams and individual volunteers who painted, laid floors, assembled furniture and set up our new space for Project Cariño clients. One individual volunteer, Dorothy Swalley, worked a few weeks as our Buddy Program Coordinator. We owe them all a huge thank you for helping!

For three decades Project Cariño has provided the services of licensed mental health professionals to McCurdy students, families and staff. Direct Services provided to MCS students and families by Project Cariño's two licensed mental health providers and four social work interns totaled 2,500 contact hours over the 2017 calendar year including therapy, crisis interventions, support groups and educational programs.

This month we will start facilitating two support groups to address anxiety and grief issues. Each group will meet every week for six weeks in our new "common building" which provides a warm and inviting atmosphere that has become a safe place for our students, counselors and interns to gather and share. Project Cariño also recently completed a series of classroom presentations on respect and relationships for approximately 380 students in kindergarten through eighth grade. Our presentations discussed self respect, respect for our peers, parents, teachers and staff. We demonstrated how respect is shared through behaviors such as using "I messages." Teachers shared the ways their students were heard practicing "I messages" as they interacted on the playground!

Collaboration conversations have also begun between Project Cariño and McCurdy Charter School to address bullying on campus. We will identify

specific interventions and propose a series of classroom presentations to combat this issue.

Our Buddy Program continues, with 16 matches made between high school students and elementary school students. They visit every week for an hour to play board games, sports, create art projects together, and sometimes the Bigs help the Littles with school work. Student intern Montana Marquez-DeYapp created a parallel process through which the Bigs are mentored by her so they

in turn can mentor their Littles. Buddy helpers (also MCS students, but not in mentoring relationships) planned a Valentine's Day party for all Buddies including fun games, activities and delicious treats! An end of year field trip is also being planned.

To guard the confidentiality of the clients we serve we are sharing historical stories below that demonstrate the difference Project Cariño makes in the lives of those we serve:

A middle school girl raised by her grandma because her parents were not capable of caring for her, was kicked out of the house when

her grandma caught her smoking marijuana. The girl stayed with a friend, and trusted a Project Cariño counselor who helped negotiate a return home. Her treatment included finding healthy ways to cope with her very stressful life.

An elementary boy, whose mother was deceased and dad was absent, was rejecting all interaction with others. Project Cariño counselors worked with him to strengthen his positive communication skills and value himself despite his early life experiences.

Although the month of February is a short month, it is a very busy one in the Pre-K program at McCurdy Ministries Community Center! Valentine's Day gives the children the opportunity to share their feelings of love and friendship with their families and with one another. This year the children will be learning songs, poems and finger plays about love and friendship.

One of the poems I introduce every year is: *Roses are Red, Violets are Blue, Can you guess who loves you?* I am not at all surprised when the children respond "JESUS!" when I introduce them to this poem. In fact, over the years this has become a very common response! It warms my heart to know the children are secure in their relationships with God. This is as it should be!

One day during February afternoon preschool I witnessed God's love and teaching in action. We were talking about Jesus and the children from Mark 10:13–16. When I introduced the passage I showed the children a party invitation and asked "What is this?" I allowed the children to respond, then told them it was an invitation. I asked if anyone had ever been invited to a party and allowed the children to share their experiences of what it felt like to be invited or what it felt like to be left out. Then I told them the story when Jesus asks the children to come to him. I emphasized Jesus left no one out of this invitation which made the children very happy. We repeated this Bible verse daily in February.

One cold February morning as the children were unpacking their backpacks, a young boy came up to me and said, "Can you help me put these in all the kids' folders, so they can take them to their home today?" When I asked what it was and told him he did not have to put them in the folder but could set them on top of the cubbies for the children to pack up themselves, he replied, "Well Ms. Sandra, these are very important. That is why I want to put them inside the folder. They are some invitations I made for my friends to come to my party and I made sure not to leave anyone out just like Jesus." I immediately helped the child put the invitations into the folders. Everyday our preschool children are a perfect example of God's love in action.

The Creating Hope, Empowering Lives Capital Campaign News update

Work on the McCurdy Ministries Community Center **Creating Hope**, **Empowering Lives Capital Campaign** to transform our campus into a Community Center, improve our space for programming, energy efficiency and handicapped accessibility continues at a rapid pace. Fundraising for Phase 1 of the campaign includes a \$1.7 million goal to update the old high school into the Cole Adult Ministries Center.

Currently, we are in the Leadership Phase of our campaign and I am pleased to share that 100% of the MMCC Board of Trustees and 100% of the McCurdy Foundation Board have made commitments to the campaign. Currently, our staff are making their prayer and financial commitments also. Leadership visits to major donors have begun to enlist their support for the campaign. This month McCurdy will make a presentation to the New Mexico Annual Conference Finance and Administration Team to gain their support of our vision for our campus and ministry.

We have also been recruiting a National Steering Committee to oversee the

campaign. Additional members will be added to the steering committee over the next month. At this point, we have commitments to serve on this committee from a dynamic group of McCurdy supporters from across the country including:

News from the development department

I am enjoying my work as the new associate director of development at McCurdy. My priority is grant research, writing, and reporting. Since joining the staff November 1, I have applied for two grants and am happy to report McCurdy was awarded both of those. In addition, I have researched and identified 35 grants we are eligible for and created a grant calendar to keep track of grant deadlines. With Diana Loomis and Patricia Alvarado's input we have determined which grants to apply for based on those best aligned with McCurdy's mission priorities. One challenge is that many grants are funded by private family foundations that

do not accept unsolicited grant proposals. This is where our development team could use your help as McCurdy supporters! Recently, Diana Loomis, traveled to Ohio to meet with the Montei Foundation, a private family foundation that usually does not accept unsolicited proposals or inquiries. McCurdy has been receiving support from the Montei Foundation since 2010 because one of our McCurdy volunteers referred us to the Montei Foundation and opened the door to a long term supportive relationship. McCurdy was invited to apply for a grant from the Montei Foundation as a result of this meeting, and I am happy to report that this is one of the 35 granting entities on my grant calendar to which we will apply! If you have or know of any contacts at other private foundations or granting organizations please do not hesitate to contact me. Together we can strategize how best to contact and make the connection with the grant maker. This is not an uncommon practice in the grants management world and one McCurdy could greatly benefit from as we strive to continue and expand our work with the children, youth, adults and families in the Española Valley.

McCurdy is also expanding the types of programming we do as we transition into a community center. Now we are eligible for a wider variety of grants from foundations and organizations because we are doing secular AND faith based programming. While we remain committed to being the hands and feet of Christ in the Española Valley, some of our programs like the High School Equivalency Program are not faith-based but are ways we help folks transform their lives. Programming areas we are expanding into are early childhood education, adult education, community based mental health services and after school programs. We are also developing programming for low income economic development, youth, arts education, capacity building for nonprofits, capital funds for renovation, energy efficiency and accessibility improvements of our buildings.

With your help we can make McCurdy's strategic plan a reality, strengthening McCurdy Ministries Community Center to better help the children, youth, adults and families of the Española Valley succeed in school and in life. I believe McCurdy has and will continue to be the empowering presence in the valley, where individuals and families have access to the resources they need to live their fullest lives in Christ.
